## Census... Use it... Do it!

Census records can provide the building blocks of your research. The first Federal Population Census was taken in 1790 and has been taken every ten years since. Because of a 72-year restriction on access to the Census, the most recent year available is 1940. The 1950 Census will be released in 2022.

The National Archives has the census schedules on microfilm available from 1790 to 1940, and most have now been digitized by our digitization partners. Family researchers generally find it most helpful to begin with the most current census and work backwards as a strategy for locating people in earlier generations.

The 2020 Census will determine congressional representation, inform hundreds of billions in federal funding every year, and provide data that will impact communities for the next decade. Not to mention the information for future genealogist!

## Historic Rural Churches Fellowship Progressive Primitive Baptist By Clayton H. Ramsey

Nostalgia's ache quivers in the space between Now and the unrecoverable Then. The rediscovery of an old love song, a yellowed photograph, a handwritten letter, and the years melt away and we are once again with people and in places long since gone.

All religions have an element of nostalgia to them, and that nostalgia is particularly strong when religious communities disband, leaving vacant pulpits and empty pews. Kelly Moran invited me to join him in a historical journey of the Fellowship Progressive Primitive Baptist Church in Shiloh, Georgia, a little thumbprint of a town in Harris County, in west-central Georgia. [*Approximately an hour southeast of MFA 2021 meeting in Covington, Georgia.*] From Atlanta, one will pass through Lewis Grizzard's Moreland, the little towns of Lutherville and Greenville, and Warm Springs, the retreat and spa for President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Regarding the land on which the church was built: A man named Jesse Fallin, born on Christmas Day, 1806, in Lunenburg, Virginia, won 202 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> acres in Muscogee County (Section 2, 22nd District, Lot #258) in the 1827 Georgia Land Lottery for the entry cost of \$18. Part of the 22nd District was split to become Harris County and the other Talbot, and Jesse's land fell on the line of division. He and his wife, Nancy Middlebrooks, worked a farm and raised children on Dotson's District of Valley Plains. On July 25, 1836, Jesse sold to his wife's brother, Thomas A. Middlebrooks, all but two acres of Lot #258 for \$1,020. Presumably, the remaining two acres were set aside for the building of a church.

Elder E.B. Seckinger wrote a brief history of the Fellowship Church. There were minutes of every meeting of the congregation from November 14, 1839 to August 23, 1981. In response to some brethren and sisters, interest developed to build a church on the Middlebrooks's property Lot #248. Creed Caldwell, minister at New Hope Primitive Baptist Church in Yatesville, was persuaded to aid in the constitution of Fellowship. The congregation grew and its membership was composed of the absolute best people of the county.

Generations of Kelly Moran's family have lived, worshiped, served, and died within the embrace of the Fellowship Progressive Primitive Baptist Church at Shiloh. Kelly is committed to telling the story of the church and her faithful. The fate of the records and the church building is uncertain. They might be passed to the Progressive Primitive Baptist Church Library and Archives in Statesboro. \*\*Thanks to Debbie Autry for contributing this article for the MFA Newsletter. The article appeared in GEORGIA BACKROADS/SPRING 2020. I took the liberty of shortening the article considerably. There is a great deal of information included about the history of many different branches of the Baptist Church and the reasons for congregations separating into different branches.
